

L01 SATORU ABE

Three Men in the Leaves, 2010 Wood Engraved Painting, 26" x 18" Estimated retail value: \$3,500

Satoru Abe has been called the Godfather of Honolulu's art scene. Abe is a painter and sculptor, born in Honolulu, Hawai'i in 1926. He studied at the California School of Fine Arts and the Art Students League in New York City and received a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1963 and a National Endowment for the Arts, Artist-in-Residence grant in 1970.

His art is known for his expressions of the cycle of life – birth, growth, death and rebirth – often symbolized by forms such as a tree, a moon, or a meditating figure. "Every day is a new adventure, and to get up every morning working on my art, is a joy that motivates. I hope to continue on, for a few more years. I hope by that time, I will be satisfied."

L02 CLAYTON AMEMIYA

Sango, 2017 Wood Fired Ceramic, 18.5" x 14.5" Estimated retail value: \$3,000

"Sango" means coral in Japanese.

Clayton Amemiya has the only existing anagama kiln in Hawai'i and is nestled in an 'ohi'a forest. Each piece is personalized by hot flames that dance from one end of the tunnel to the other. Even though it takes four days to tend the fire, the anagama allows Clayton to get much wider variations in glaze than he could with a gas kiln.



L03 ROCKY WAKINIKONA ASING

Fish Rock, 2018

Pōhaku Carving - Pahoehoe Imu Rock, 11" x 10" x 4" Estimated retail value: \$3,000

Kālai pōhaku, translated from Hawaiian, means stone cutter, or to carve or hew stone. In ancient Hawai'i this role was reserved for men, and stone cutters were respected craftsmen whose teachings would be passed down from generation to generation.

Rocky is a descendant of rock carvers, born on Oahu and the youngest of five children. He grew up on a pig farm and learned from a very young age to work hard in school and with the land. "Everything in this world is touched by pōhaku in some way" Rocky says. His handcarved lava rocks received the blessings of his kāhuna (wise man), and therefore may be safely removed from the islands and their unique beauty enjoyed everywhere.



L04 CHARLES COHAN

Woods VII, 2012

Woodcut Print on Paper, 40" x 46" Estimated retail value: \$3,200

Cohan is Professor of Art and Chair of Printmaking in the Department of Art and Art History at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. He works under the moniker 'Arm and Roller Press' when printing for other artists and community events, and is co-founder of the Honolulu based Lithopixel Refactory Collective print performance troupe.

Woods VII is from Cohan's Samish series, depicting a grove of black cherry trees on family property in Washington beloved by his mother. About four years ago, she began a decline into memory loss, and about the same time, Cohan noticed the cherries were struck by a blight that would ultimately take their lives. Those processes became a part of the work.

L05 LINDA CONNOR

Circle and Crack, Pu'u Loa, Hawai'i - Artist Proof

Inkjet Print, 30" x 24"
Estimated retail value: \$3,100

Linda Connor has had a long and distinguished career in photography and has traveled extensively across the globe to produce her work. Connor's peripatetic practice demonstrates a longstanding interest in the relationship between systems of belief and the natural world.

"I first visited Hawai'i in the late 70s and have been coming back regularly ever since. The Big Island draws me—in particular the amazing landscapes of Volcanoes National Park. The petroglyph photograph is one of the extensive group of petroglyphs on the lava surface at the Pu'u Loa site in the Park. Hawai'i is one of the most magical places on the planet and I want my photographs to celebrate it."





L06 ANDREA DEZSÖ

Land of Fairy Tales, 2017 Stone Lithography Print, 27" x 20.5" Estimated retail value: \$900

"This print was made during an artist residency in China, with imagery inspired by tile artwork in a Hong Kong temple. These beings are protectors; Dragons are traditionally invoked to protect against fires, while Bats are believed to bring good fortune. I intended to create a playful picture of richness and abundance. I find the symbolism and potency of invoking protectors to be relevant in our contemporary times. May this artwork bring you good fortune."

Andrea Dezsö is a visual artist who works across a broad range of media including drawing, painting, artist's books, embroidery, cut paper, animation, sculpture, site-specific installation and public art. She is a 2019 Donkey Mill Art Center Artist-in-Residence.



L07 KEVIN DIMINYATZ

Samsara World, 2017

Encaustic Monotype on Panel, 30" x 45" x 1.5"

Estimated retail value: \$2,200

"Samsara World" is from a series inspired by "Ukyoye" woodblock prints from the Edo period in Japan. Ukyoye translates to "Floating World", but the Kanji character can be interpreted as "Samsara World" or the world of suffering. In Zen, the world of suffering happens simultaneously with the world of enlightenment, and to Diminyatz there is a certain sadness expressed in this piece.

For this series, Diminyatz worked within the same format as Ukyoye prints, and borrowed curvilinear shapes and lines reminiscent of flowing kimonos, Samurai swords and hair styles. The process is spontaneous while giving little thought to the actions. Pure pigment, beeswax, and darmar varnish crystal were melted on a large hot plate, with prints pulled and archivally laminated to birch plywood.

Kevin Diminyatz is currently a lecturer in the Art Departments of UH Hilo and Hawai'i Community College.

L08 PETER DURST

Immigrants All, 2017 Ceramic, 48" x 10" x 10" Estimated retail value: \$3.600

"I have always loved Emma Lazarus' poem, "The New Colossus" a part of which is inscribed on the base of Lady Liberty and concludes with her saying "I lift my lamp beside the golden door." The torch welcoming and lighting the way, and the golden door a metaphor for entrance into our great land.

"Immigrant's All" is both an homage to those who have come before, with an honor roll of the names inscribed, just a tiny fraction of those millions, and with a lock on the golden door, an indictment of a very broken immigration system."

Peter Durst has been a potter, sculptor and ceramicist for almost 50 years, with work exhibited nationwide, and has taught at the Donkey Mill for nearly a decade.





LO9 ANDRZEJ KRAMARZ

Untitled - From the series "Vessels", 2018

Photograph, 20" x 25"

Estimated retail value: \$700

"The series, Vessels doesn't reveal a person's relationship with self, whether a body might be a home or a prison to an individual. It doesn't reveal nationality or social status. It anonymously reveals the beauty of the living container in its state of ceaseless transition. " Andrzej Kramarz is a Polish- American artist, lecturer, curator, and editor of photography books.

Using photography, found pictures, archives, audio and video, Andrzej is primarily a conceptual artist who creates installations that explore the function of people, places, and objects in the construction of mnemonics – those fictions by which we revivify the past, extrapolate the future, and invent the present.



L10 WAYNE LEVIN

Aholehole in a Cloudy Seascape, 2013 Archival Pigment Print, 24" x 16" Estimated retail value: \$1,500

"This is the last instant to save the oceans. The young generations have to do a much better job than my generation did to curb global warming, cut down on the use of plastics, stop oil spills and cut down overfishing. The purpose of some of my work is to educate and raise awareness about the ocean, but some of my work is to make people wonder, question their preconceptions of reality."

Wayne Levin uses his curiosity for life beneath the surface to document the ocean from every angle through black and white analog photography.

L11 MIHO MORINOUE

Deluvium, 2018 Photolithography, Printer's Proof, 70" x 36" Estimated retail value: \$4,400

Deluvium or deluge is a large scale drawing using graphite on denril that depicts a scene mixed of myth and reality right before a great cleanse. The original drawing was transformed into a photolithotroph and published by master printmaker Bud Shark of Shark's Ink.

Miho Kanani Morinoue is a Hawai'i based artist living in Holualoa, Hawai'i, raised by two visual artists, Hiroki and Setsuko Morinoue. Miho has an extensive background in both art and dance. Her art can be found in the collections of the Library of Congress, DC and the Whitney Museum of American Art, NY.



L12 JOSEPH STER

Untitled - Palm Tree Oil on Canvas, 38" x 26" Estimated retail value: \$3,000

"There were coconuts, I liked it so I painted it."

Joseph Ster was a research chemist for a major company until he decided to devote all of his time to art. He began by designing jewelry, then crafting wall pieces of various metals, and has also worked with koa wood and raku ceramics; explaining "I transform the clay and the clay transforms me."

In the 1970's Joseph began painting. He has painted with Maria del Carmen Clavo and Vincent Farrell. Joseph is inspired by nature and organic shapes, and he doesn't consider himself an artist, but a worker. Joseph continues to evolve and expand in the arts, he is inspired by beauty, and he works with it.




